FAD 2006 UK fashion competition

WGSN reports from the 2006 final of the national Fashion Awareness Direct awards. After a clean sweep at last year's final, Nottingham Trent returned to the spotlight with fashion student Terri Cohen taking the coveted first prize.


The final, held on **March 22** in the splendid Shoreditch Town Hall in London's East End was a significant event for the team at Fashion Awareness Direct (FAD). As well as celebrating the sixth edition of the competition it was announced **FAD have succeded in becoming officially registered as an educational charity**.

Each year FAD sets a brief for final year students inspired by an international city or country. This year the competition was entitled "Urban Nomad, objects trouvés". Entrants were invited to become "fashion archaeologists" and to be inspired by ancient Egypt.

The brief asked for two garments – the first inspired by the "lashing" together of fabrics in the essence of ancient Egypt, and the second to focus on geometric shapes and protecting the body in imitation of the "building-wrap" sculptures of Christo and Jeanne-Claude.

Students were asked to produce **two garments**.

- The first "Charm" consisting of fabrics "lashed" together, concealing jewels and amulets.
- The second "Geometric", a piece of clothing triangular and geometric in shape which "protects" the body and imitates the "building-wrap" sculptures of Christo and Jeanne-Claude.

20 finalists from 13 colleges presented the results to a panel of industry judges including *The Daily Telegraph*'s fashion director **Hilary Alexander**, designer **Jens Laugesen** and **Victoria Miro** of the Miro galleries.

Terri Cohen, of Nottingham Trent, was the unanimous winner of the first prize and was awarded £2,000 prize money. Hand-dyed silk, hand-stitched strips and individual printed cotton all formed part of Terri Cohen's stunning designs, which judges commented "evoked artist Christo's wrappings and ancient Egypt in an original and imaginative manner".

Louise de Caires, FAD's creative director and one of the judges, commented on the students interpretations of this year's brief: "As each new generation comes through art/fashion school the edges blur between the disciplines, and the interpretation is linked more closely to uncovering and dissecting the elements of the brief and researching a particular artist.

"This translates into amazing textile experimentation, for students who refuse to buy "over the counter" fabrics, but try to reinvent the original looking closely at how to achieve this through processes like burying raw cloth in sand, magnifying a corner of rug and producing a painting. **The art element in fashion is here to stay!**"
