Urban Avanguardia: Italian cool is back in fashion

The judges for the 2003 FAD Graduate Fashion Competition are announced as follows:

The judges will decide the winner and two runners-up on 9th April 2003 at a fashion installation to take place at the Victoria and Albert Museum. The 2003 competition, which is endorsed by the British Fashion Council, is being organised by Fashion Awareness Direct in collaboration with the Italian Cultural Institute. Entitled *Urban Avanguardia: Italian Cool is Back in Fashion*, this year's competition has an Italian and operatic theme. Entrants are to take inspiration from Puccini's *Madame Butterfly*, Fortuny's designs and the city of Venice, to create two outfits - a timeless museum piece called *Past Historic* and a contemporary piece called *Future Historic*.

The 15 short-listed students come from 9 fashion colleges and were selected from the many entries sent from participating colleges across the UK. Louise de Caires from FAD comments: "It is fascinating to see how each student has interpreted the given brief and drawn on different aspects of it in their design and choice of fabrics, colours and textures." Sponsorship for the competition has been secured from Direct Image Printers, the Italian Trade Commission and M.O.T. Textiles. Kenneth Collins from M.O.T. says: "The company has been run since 1937 by three generations of the Collins family, who have always believed in supporting students and believe that the future of the industry is in their capable hands. Many students who have been supplied by us in the past have moved on to the higher echelons of the trade and we are still supplying them many years later."

Mario Fortunato, Director of the Italian Cultural Institute says: "We are delighted to be associated with the FAD Graduate Fashion Competition 2003 as this is a wonderful example of a link between art and fashion with an Italian inspiration; and equally a help to all the young students who wish to pursue a career in the world of fashion".

Fashion Awareness Direct has been organising this annual competition for three years with the aim of supporting young designers when they need it most and encouraging them to link fashion, art, and culture.

Notes on Judges

LUCA MISSONI, representing Missoni:

The House of Missoni has a special connection to the city of London: its founders Ottavio and Rosita met here in 1948. Luca's father was running in the finals of the 400 metres in the Olympics and his mother was watching. It was said of Missoni creations: 'They are museum pieces, but you can wear them' (Maria Pezzi in *Il Giorno*, 1979) and Rosita and Ottavio's work can be seen in art and textile collections across the world. In 1983 they made their debut in costume design when they created over a hundred costumes for Donizetti's opera, Lucia di Lammermoor, at La Scala in Milan, which starred Pavarotti. To add to their many achievements, Rosita and Ottavio received, in 1997, from the Royal Society for the encouragement of Arts (RSI), the award 'Honorary Royal Designer for Industry' and, in 1999, an Honorary Doctorate from the Central Saint Martin's College of Art and Design. At present Missoni is run by the new generation: Vittorio, Luca and their sister Angela. Luca's particular interest lies in men's fashion, knitwear and textile.

DARRYL JAFFRAY, Director of Education, Royal Opera House:

An Australian by birth, Darryl Jaffray joined the Royal Ballet Company in 1964. Later she gained a psychology degree and Postgraduate Certificate of Education. She is a Fellow of the RSA and a member of the All Souls Group. In addition to her full time post at the Royal Opera House, she writes, lectures and examines

Born in Montreal, Suzanne Lussier gained an MA in the History of Dress at the Courtauld Institute of Arts. She specialised in 20th century and contemporary fashion and is the author of Art Deco Fashion V&A Publications (2003).

Fashion in Motion at the V&A offers the chance to see inspiring contemporary fashion, as it bridges the gap between live catwalk shows and static museum displays. Conveying the energy of fashion as performance, models walk through the Museum's sculpture gallery wearing the latest collections by top designers.
